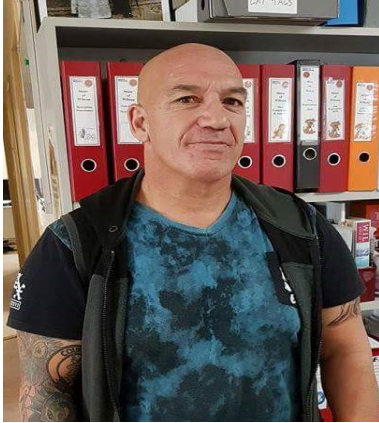

Recreation & Leisure Coordinator Report

Hi All

We have had a very busy time down here at the Recreation Centre with Circuit classes going well with a steady bunch of people taking the time to get fit while socializing and mingling with each other outside of work times. We are running classes 3 days a week, Sunday, Monday and Wednesday's with 5 of the medical team checking the children's eyes came along for a work out while they were in town.

I have started running circuit classes for the teenagers in town, this is to prepare them for the evening classes once they have gained their own confidence and understanding of how circuit is run and the expectations required of individuals when involved in a group activity. At this stage I have had four young men turning up to train, and they are proactive and enthusiastic to gain knowledge and do something that sits outside their normal daily routines in Wiluna. The goal is for the boys to become part of a group of people working together for their own individual goals by feeding off of each other when we all sweat, laugh, hurt and encourage each other together.

We showed two movies over the month and they were *Aliens Ate My Homework* and *The Star*. The children's behaviour was very good, so congratulations to them. I had willing helpers with the children being very happy to make popcorn and give out drinks during the movies.

The Moonlight Hall was opened for both Bledisloe Cup games with the Wallabies being piped at the post by the boy's in black, with the All Blacks retaining the Bledisloe Cup for another year. There was a cross section of people who attended both games with guests from the Gunbarrel Laager, Police, Service Contractors, Medical staff from NAHS and locals who enjoyed an afternoon of friendly banter and yarning in the sun shine on the porch.

On Sunday 26th August we had another Trash & Treasure under the porch of the Wiluna Enterprise Centre that was well attended, with plenty of bargain's with Angela and Julie having tables of goodies to buy, however the big winners on the day was the Shire lots of goods from the hotel units that were sold.

On Wednesday 5th September we kicked off the "Back to Wiluna" which saw a big contingent of children using the new interactive equipment on the oval while listening to the mellow sounds of Gina and Guy. Mary G was a big hit with the children while keeping the grown ups entertained with her off beat banter. Mary G's radio show gave the Shire and the town of Wiluna national exposure, even the little town on the edge of the desert got to shine right across Australia that night. Ray Ryder and the boys ended the night with the locals finally getting out of their cars to brave the cold chill to dance the evening away. We had a good cross section of the community attending our first gig, the children played through out the five hours, while the adults relaxed and stayed warm in their cars before the big dance off at the end of the night

On Thursday 6th September we held another night of music adjacent to the Recreation Centre, once again the children flocked to the event in mass, Gina and Guy played the first set mainly to the visitors in town and the children, once again Mary G had the children captivated through out her performance, by the end of the night we had another dance off with the Ray Ryder Band rocking the party with the locals taking full advantage to let their hair down and get their boogie on, as the venue was warmer than the night before with entertainers finding it more personal.

Friday morning saw Mark put on a show at the School assembly for the children, and Mr Keith Payne VC also attended, where he spoke to the children before the teachers had a dance off and sing song. We all attended morning tea, before Gina and Guy spent the last hour and half in Wiluna teaching the children their new Martu welcome song.



On Friday 7th the outside movie which was set up at the front of the Recreation Centre to view Wonder and there was a bumper crowd in attendance with over 100 people attending. By the end of the movie the numbers of locals had swelled in preparation for the fireworks, which saw the sky light up with colour.

Lastly I would like to thank Linaire for all your awahi (love) and wairua (spirit) you brought and shared through out the 3 days with everyone you had contact with, as without your help the experiences for all would have been less than they had. They say many hands make light work so thank you to Raj, Eva, Madjeed and Julie G for your hands and time you gave on Friday evening to make the night a success, and to the upside down theatre company, thank you Jim for helping me in my time of need as time was rolling on, as we had many families waiting to watch Wonder and you turned up when the blow up screen was still in its carry bag. Lucky we worked out before the show we had erected the movie screen upside down, now that could have ruined the night some what if we had not worked that one out in time.

Town Pride In the New Centre



Past and present Wiluna residents gathered on Thursday 6th September to celebrate the opening of a new administration building and discovery centre, representing the start of a new era for the northern Goldfields town.

Shire of Wiluna Chief Executive Officer Colin Bastow said the Shire had used the occasion to hold three days of Back to Wiluna celebrations and the response from the community had been overwhelmingly positive.

The new administration centre, a reconstruction of Wiluna's Club Hotel after the local council bought the 85 year old pub last year, cost about \$4 million to construct, and the discovery centre cost \$2.6 million.

Mr Bastow said the administration centre would allow Wiluna to have a town hall, which it did not previously, and also made the Shire offices more accessible and visual.

"We've stamped ourselves as being part of the community", he said. He said despite some initial backlash from the community at the fact the town would lose its only remaining tavern for good, the decision to renovate the building into an administration centre had been strategic.

"That building would only have been able to continue operating for another couple of years anyway—it was always going to close eventually and by then it would likely have been too old and expensive for us to revamp," he said. "the upstairs area was not being used at all, which wasn't a good use of space, and we are now able to have our town hall there.

"If there needs to be a tavern in town it needs to be in a building that is more suitable and viable for the community."

He said the discovery centre would serve as a place to store and display the town's rich history, to ensure none of it was lost. "Both buildings have been well received and the whole community has engaged in some way, and the feeling in the town regarding these projects is very positive," he said.

Member for Kalgoorlie Kyran O'Donnell, one of the number of politicians in attendance at the opening of the two buildings—alongside Labour's Kyle McGinn, the Liberals' Melissa Price, Ken Baston, One Nation's Robin Scott and the Nationals WA's Vince Catania, Mia Davies and Jacqui Boydell—said there was a "very good feeling in the town" at the moment.

"These two new buildings are already having an impact, they will lift the town."

"This is a great thing for Wiluna and the next thing for the town, as well as for the rest of the Goldfields, will be the sealing of the Wiluna-Meekatharra road."

You assisted in giving the little town of Wiluna national exposure on your radio show. You grabbed the children's attention at the School assembly with a sing along and the teachers dance off. The best gift of all from Mary G was giving the children of the town the opportunity to share the bright lights of the stage with a generous soul that let a little of her light shine on the kids.

To our local band "The Muntijjarra Band" thank you for some great music on Wednesday Night. You are all musicians that the town of Wiluna can be proud of, the way that you guys held your own and performed on par with the crowd from the big smoke.

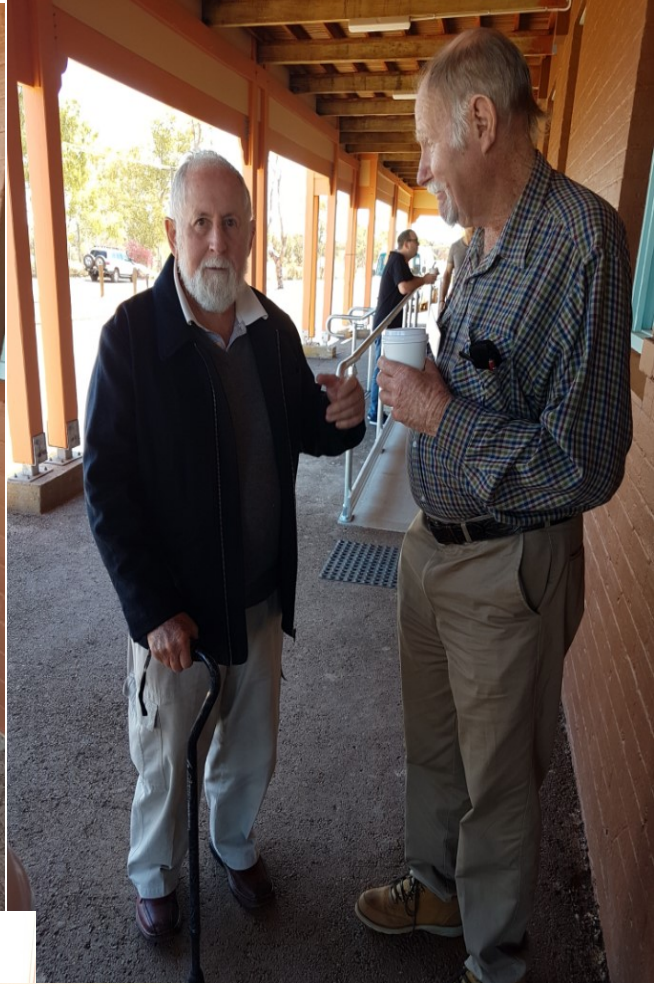

The linguists from the Goldfields Aboriginal Language Centre (GALC) will be visiting Wiluna from the 1st to the 3rd of October 2018.

Linguistic Work

GALC linguists are keen to meet with people to discuss the Aboriginal languages of the town and the resources available for speakers and language learners. We'll bring a range of material for people to have a look at. We'll bring resources in Tjupan, Kuwarra, Putjarra, Ngaanyatjarra, Pitjantjatjarra, Ngalia, Kaalamaya, Ngadju and other languages.

If you are a fluent or partially fluent language speaker, we're keen to chat with you! If you're interested in making sure your language is recorded and resources made for the enjoyment of the language and for kids to learn it, we'd like to speak with you too!

Interpreters

The linguists are also very interested to speak with any fluent Aboriginal language speakers who are interested in training to **qualify as an interpreter**. Interpreters mostly provide interpreting over the phone and on video conferencing. Occasionally interpreters will do face-to-face work such as for DCP, the court or the Police. *If you want to train and work as an interpreter, we're the people to see!*

It Takes a Village to Raise a Child Coming together to Engage our Potential

“It takes a village to raise a child” is an African proverb usually used to think about community relationships, involvement and partnerships needed to nurture youth in a village to grow people and develop skills, to face the world. This phrase is relevant to education in Wiluna.

Everyone has a story about their school life—lessons they loved and subjects they slept through. Some of our old people too, have bitter-sweet memories where they learned new ways of being, but were not allowed to maintain their old ways. Today, all schools in WA follow the West Australian curriculum, and all are encouraged to work with their communities to localize their learning and respect all ways of being.

We do that at Wiluna Remote Community School through our Martu Calendar and through our learning partnerships with community, Desert Support Services and CRTAFE. Through this work, and listening to families, we have noticed that our students love many things: art, music, mechanics, language and culture.

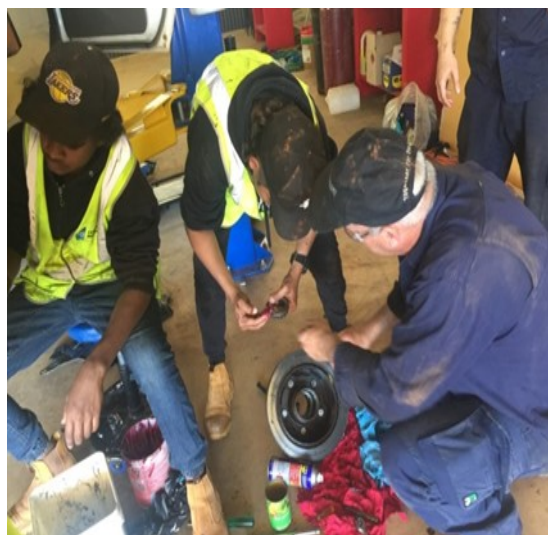


So how can we relate these interest to the students, and make the curriculum relevant to them? How can we make good on our School Council’s aspiration that the “Sky is the Limit”?

In it’s simplest terms, any school and community will face two challenges. The first challenge puts employment at the centre: “how they can ensure their youth are getting the right skills to get jobs that support the community?” This is a demand-orientated approach that has often been the focus of schooling.

The second challenge puts the child at the centre: how can the community support their children’s individuality and interests so that they become people who will have an impact on the world? This is an individual-oriented approach that comes from the students’ inquiry, interest and imagination.

We are addressing both of those challenges at once. Last week, secondary teachers at Wiluna RCS finished an intensive 4 day foundation training course in Big Picture Education (BPE). BPE is a rethinking of learning so that it is focused around the individual learner, his or her skills, interests and aspirations. It’s a formal framework for learning that aligns with how we work as a school and it will help us continue how we work into the future. There are 12 ‘distinguishers’ that define BPE.



They look like this:

Distinguishers	How we do it at Wiluna RCS (WRCS)
<p>1. Academic rigour: Head, heart and hand</p>	<p>At WRCS we have a strong intellectual purpose for all of our students.</p> <p>We work to help them develop academically in a cross-cultural context with a focus on standard Australian English. Many of our students are learning English as an additional language/dialect, so we explicitly teach them these language skills in context.</p> <p>Through constant challenge we encourage students to deepen their knowledge across five learning goals and to build on their own knowledge to enhance their ability to be cross-cultural communicators.</p>
<p>2. Leaving to learn: Learning through internships</p>	<p>Ranger and station work pathways are highly valued by students as well as local businesses. We have a partnership with the local ranger group where we train together at the training center and on country.</p> <p>We have connections throughout our local community. We are continually seeking to develop new links with local business to support the real world learning of our students. We work to connect students to great mentors and work that matters through internships.</p>
<p>3. Personalisation: One student at a time</p>	<p>Students will be getting support from their teachers, mentors, families and peers.</p> <p>Every student has a learning plan that works to bring their personal interests to the front of their learning journey.</p> <p>Families and advisory teachers will regularly work together to review and update learning plans.</p>
<p>4. Authentic assessment</p>	<p>We assess students on the quality of their work and how this work changes them. Each term students develop a portfolio of their work and present it to family, mentors and their advisory teacher.</p>
<p>5. Collaboration for learning</p>	<p>We are proud that there is a high level of community engagement and leadership around two-way science learning. We are developing our multi-generational model of learning. This cultural/social collaboration motivates students to learn because it is meaningful.</p> <p>We intend to continue to engage students in learning in and with the community.</p>

Dear Wiluna Residents

Blackham is excited to announce the recommencement of open pit mining activities in the old Wiluna Mine Area approximately 3.5 km from the Wiluna townsite and Bondini Community.

For open pit mining operations, blasting activities form a routine part of the total mining activities.

We do not expect Wiluna residents to be exposed to any hazards as a result of these blasting activities. Wiluna residents may notice some noise from these events, depending on the prevailing weather conditions.

Please be advised that the first blast will occur at 14:00 hrs on the 9th September with subsequent blasts on a regular basis. The nominal blasting time is expected to be 14:00 hrs on those days on which blasting will occur. This may be subject to change due to site operational and weather conditions.

Prior to a blast the mine site entrance "blast notice boards" will be updated with time/ date of blast as well as blast guards positioned to prevent unauthorised personnel accidentally entering the blasting area. From the Wiluna town and Bondini community residents may potentially also hear the blast guard siren which is sounded 15 minutes prior to a blast as a notification.

Blasting will be carried out in accordance with Federal and State legislative requirements as per the "Mines Safety and Inspection Act 1994 and Regulations 1995".

All blasts are planned and designed to achieve the required outcome with minimal impact to the surrounding environment. If you require further information please contact the Registered Manager or Quarry Manager on 08 6166 9490.

\$22.5 million to build stronger communities

Member for North West Central Vince Catania is encouraging community groups, sporting organisations and local governments in the North West Central electorate to put forward project submissions for the Federal Government's *Stronger Communities Programme*.

Mr Catania said applications for Round 4 of the *Stronger Communities Programme* are now open and will deliver \$22.5 million in funding to communities across Australia.

"The funding is being distributed evenly across all Federal electorates, with each electorate being given \$150,000 to go towards local projects."

The *Stronger Communities Programme* is focused on projects which bring communities together, build community participation, and improve social connections.

"While these may not be your big, nation-building projects, they are every bit as important in terms of supporting our local communities, creating local jobs, and making sure we have facilities and services we can be proud of in our regional areas," Mr Catania said.

The Nationals WA Senate Candidate, Nick Fardell, said potential projects could include small capital works, such as upgrading a community hall, improving street-scapes or bike-lanes, or improving disability access to facilities.

"There's plenty of advice available online on how to get your application together, including sample forms and FAQs, so there's no excuse not to get your application together and send it to your local Federal MP for consideration," Mr Fardell said.

Interested organisations are eligible for grants of between \$2,500 and \$20,000, covering 50 per cent of eligible project costs.

Applications opened on Monday 6 August 2018, and close on Thursday 11 October 2018.

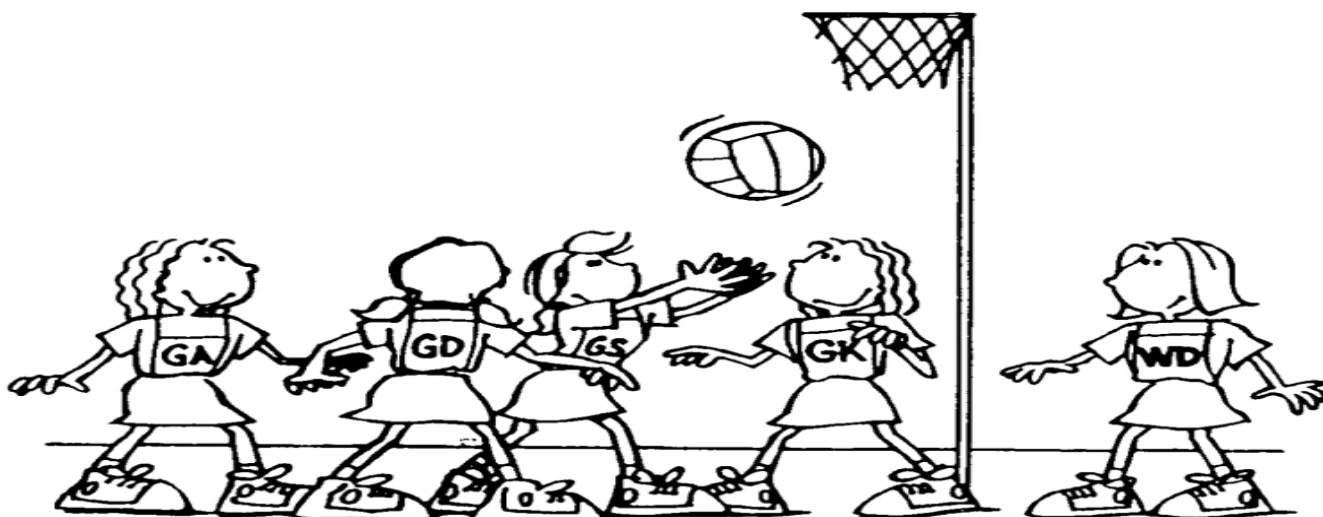

The linguists from the Goldfields Aboriginal Language Centre (GALC) will be visiting Wiluna from the 1st to the 3rd of October 2018.

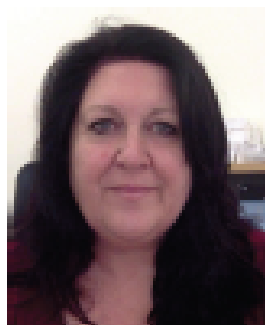
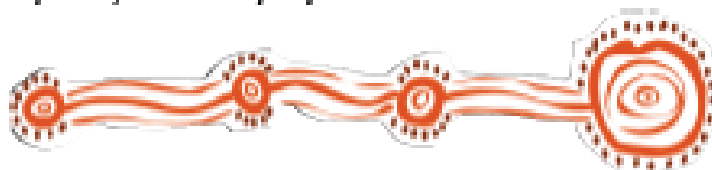
Linguistic Work

Slow cooker chicken casserole

This is the slow cooker chicken casserole that you throw on before you run out the door to work in the morning. It has easy shortcuts that will have you coming home to a delicious smell and nutritious meal.



ingredients

- 3 tbs vegetable oil
- 1 kg chicken breast (cut into chunks)
- 1 kg brushed potatoes (peeled, cut into chunks)
- 2 tins cream of chicken condensed soup
- 1 tbs chicken stock powder
- 2 cups water
- 500 g chunky frozen vegetables
- 1 cup parsley (chopped)

method

1. In a frying pan, heat the oil and fry the chicken pieces until golden on each side. You may have to do this in batches.
2. Place the chicken in the slow cooker with the potatoes, condensed soup, stock powder, water and vegetable mix. Combine well.
3. Cover and cook for 3 hours on HIGH or 6 hours on LOW.
4. Stir through parsley just before serving.

3 ingredient biscuits

Yes you can make biscuits with just three ingredients and I bet you have them in your pantry right now. Slide a spoon of Nutella between two and that makes 4 ingredients!

prep: 0:10 | cook 0:15



ingredients

- 1 cup peanut butter
- 1 cup caster sugar
- 1 egg

method

1. Preheat oven to 180°C (160°C fan-forced). Line a baking tray with baking paper and set aside.
2. Place all ingredients into a bowl and combine well.
3. Roll tablespoon-sized balls and place on the tray. Push down each one with a fork.
4. Bake for 10-15 minutes. Leave to cool on the tray for 5 minutes and then further cool on a wire rack.

notes

- If your mixture is a little too dry you can add a few drops of milk to moisten it.
- I like to make a double batch of these so we cook once and then eat twice.
- These are delicious if you spread Nutella on them and sandwich them together.
- If you've added a slide of Nutella to these biscuits, you'll also love these flaky **3 ingredient Nutella croissants**.
- If you prefer almonds to peanuts, give this recipe for **3-ingredient almond biscuits** a whirl.

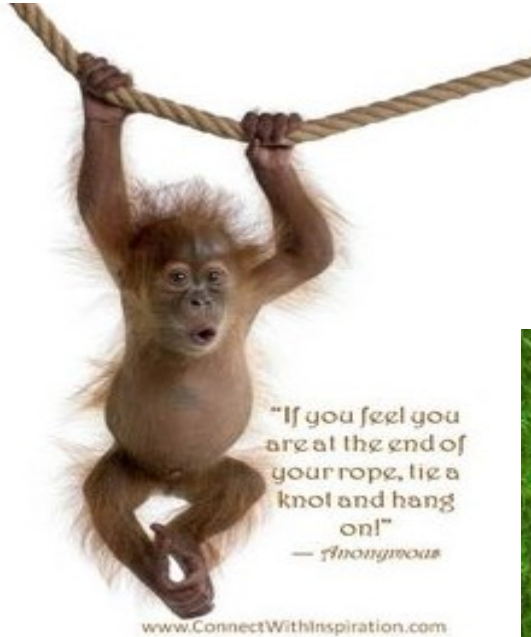

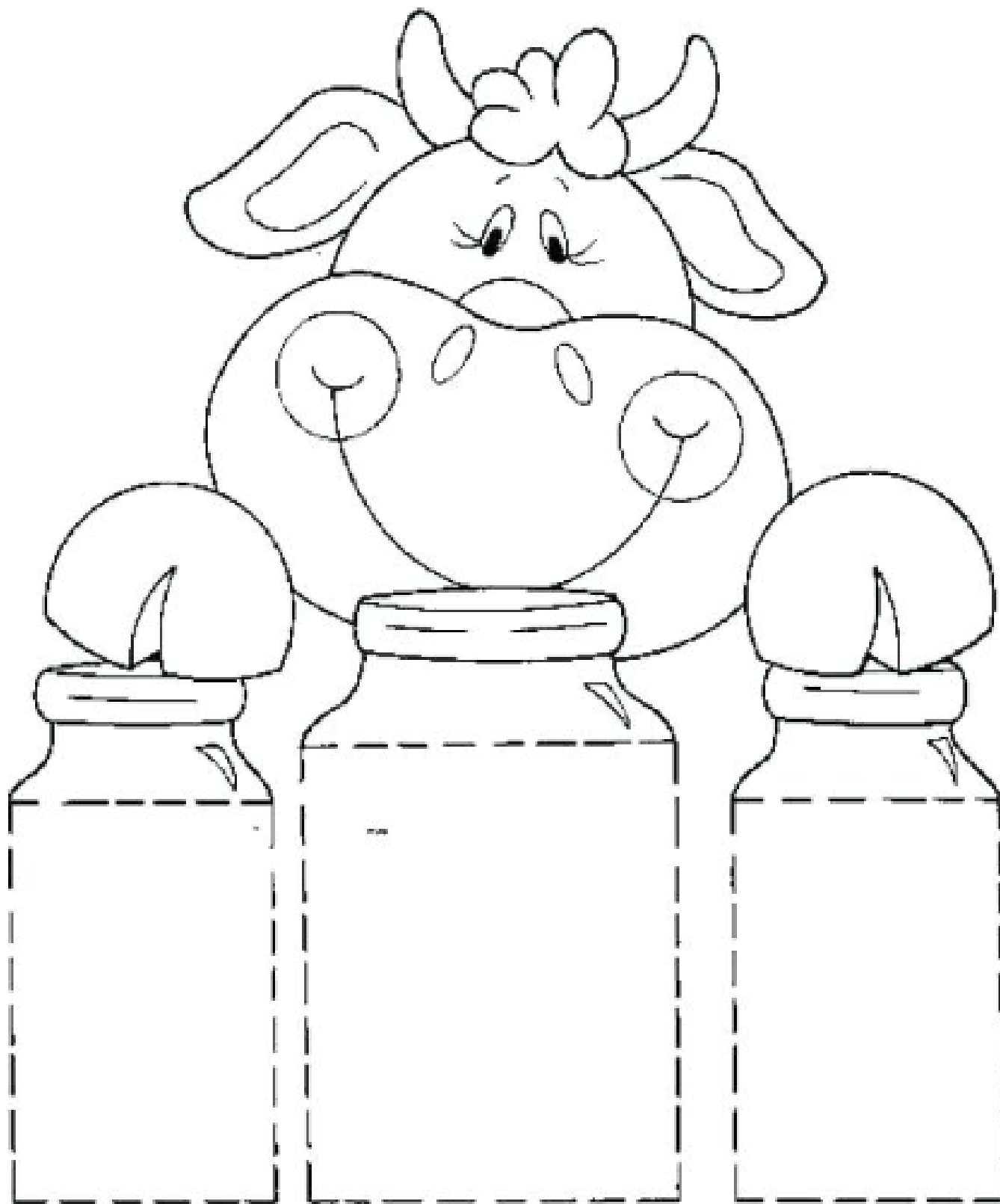

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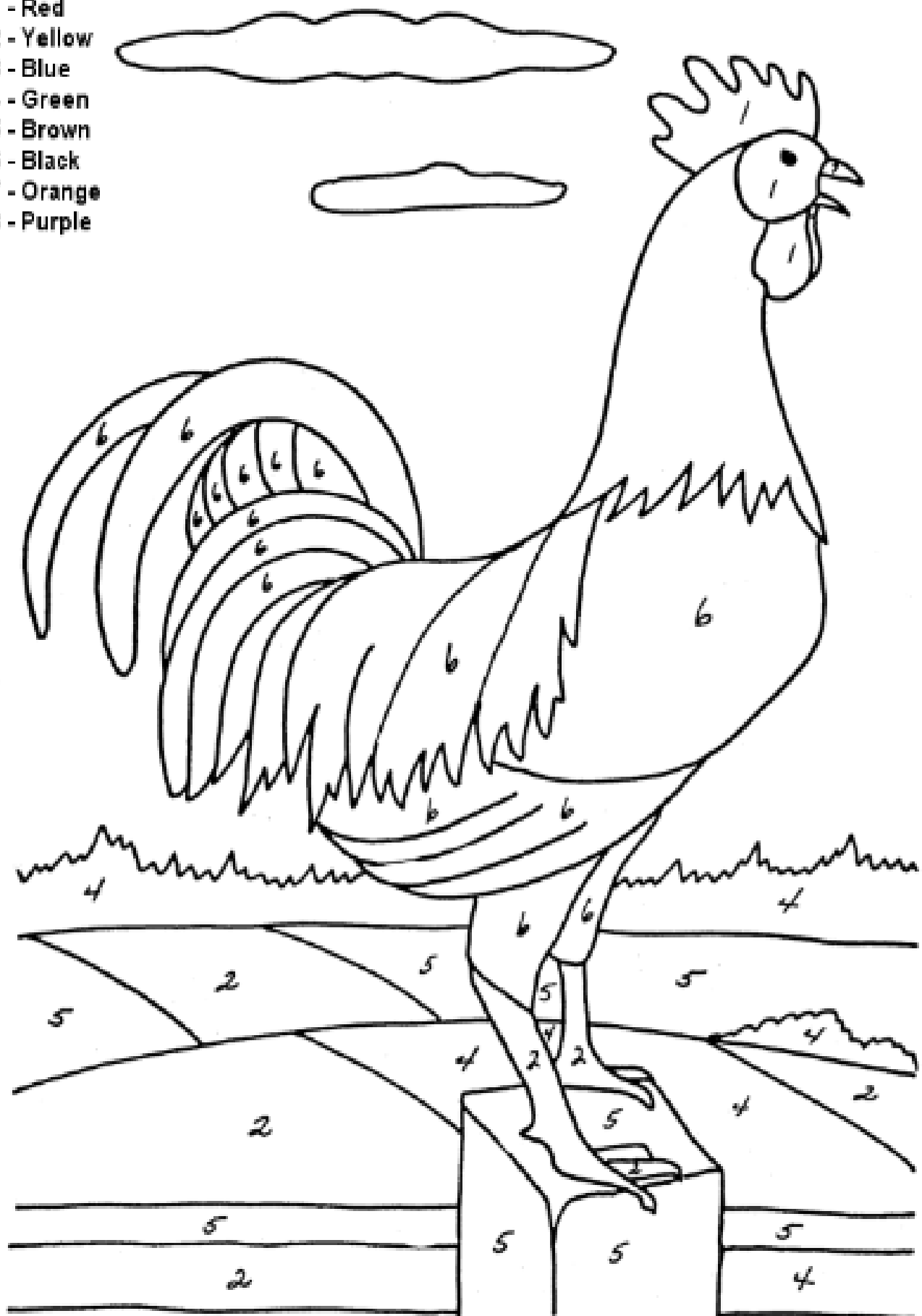
