The final works to be done to the main street will focus on constructing children's games such as hopscotch.

Work is about to start on the relocation of the gym to the oval change rooms. This will allow for greater focus on youth activities at the Youth Centre.

The outcome from the recent Shire elections that was held on the 19 October 2019 resulted in, Cr Norma Ward being re-elected to council as well as the appointment of three new Councillors, Cr Tim Carmody, Cr Brodie Sawyer and Cr Ane Koroicure. I would like to thank past Councillors for their service over the last 4 years.

Planning is currently underway for the Shire annual community Christmas Party. Blackhams Resources has again committed to sponsoring the event which is greatly appreciated. Further information will be made available in the coming weeks.

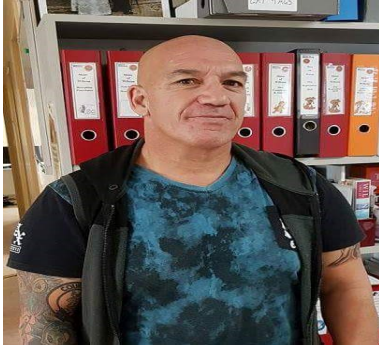



Update from our Rangers



The Birriliburu and Matuwa and Kurrara Kurrara Rangers have been hard at work, recently hosting the 2019 Southern Desert Ranger Forum (SDRF).

This annual event and incredible gathering provides an opportunity for Indigenous ranger teams to meet up and share knowledge, build and maintain relationships and undertake training exercises.

Thirteen Ranger groups and around 120 people participated in the epic event, which was held at Matuwa (formerly Lorna Glen Station) on Matuwa and Kurrara Kurrara Indigenous Protected Area (IPA) and then on to Milyiniri (Well 6) and Katjarra (Carnarvon Range) on Birriliburu IPA.

The Rangers in Attendance were from Kanyirninpa Jukurrpa - Jigalong Rangers, Ngaanyatjarra - Warakurna Rangers, Ngaanyatjarra - Blackstone Rangers, Ngaanyatjarra - Warburton Rangers, Spinifex Rangers, Ngadju Rangers, Oak Valley Rangers, APY - Anangu Pitjantjatjara Yankunytjatjara Warru Rangers, Malgana Land and Sea, Gingirana Rangers and Tjiwarl Rangers. What a mob!



Collectively these ranger groups manage a whopping 1.2 million square kilometres across Western Australia and South Australia.

Forums such as this strengthen the important regional Indigenous land management capacity across the desert.

Rangers left the Forum with improved skills in first aid (Wilderness First Aid Australia), automotive & 4WD driving (Central Regional TAFE), fire and weed management (10 Deserts Project) and

inspiration about two-way science programs with schools (CSIRO). Old relationships and networks were rekindled, and new ones were formed. Ideas, enthusiasm, pride and support for each other wound through the event.

The trainers who worked with the rangers were absolutely fabulous.

An incredible collaborative painting was created in the spare moments, with panels representing stories of where the SDRF19 groups had come from - including a turtle by our visitors from Malgana Land and Sea Management.



The event had amazing sponsors, some of whom even volunteered to be victims in the remote first aid scenarios – which was above and beyond the call of duty!

Thanks again to the sponsors, the 10 Deserts Project, the Great Victoria Desert Biodiversity Trust, Northern Star Resources, CSIRO and the Hon Kyle McGinn MLC.

A big shout out also to the crew from the Indigenous Desert Alliance who supported the organising of this event. The IDA empowers Indigenous people managing Australia's desert country to realise their social/cultural, environmental and economic aspirations. 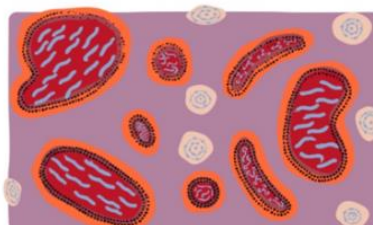

Some Remembrance Day

Facts

- The word 'armistice' means a truce or peace arrangement. It comes from the Latin word 'arma', meaning arms and 'stitium', meaning 'a stopping', giving us the meaning: to put down your arms (weapons).
- The famous poem In Flanders Fields that made the red poppy such as iconic symbol, was written by Canadian Lieutenant Colonel John McRae. It is said that it only took him 20 minutes to write and that after he had finished the poem he threw it away and a fellow soldier saved it.
- It was not just men who went to war. In World War I, many Australian women volunteered as cooks, drivers, interpreters and other skilled positions. Female nurses served in countries such as Egypt, France and Greece, often in dangerous conditions, close to the frontline where they faced regular shelling.
- World War I was the first armed conflict where aircraft were used. There were around 3000 Australian airmen who served with the Australian Flying Corps.
- The conditions in the World War I trenches were so appalling that they gave their name to numerous ailments that soldiers developed while there. These ailments included "Trench Foot" a fungal foot infection, "Trench Nephritis" which was an inflammation of the kidneys and 'Trench Fever' a painful infection that was caused by lice.
- It is estimated that the World War I system of trenches on the Western Front was approximately 764km (475 miles) in length.
- Rosemary is often worn on Remembrance Day. An old tale describes the Virgin Mary spreading her blue cloak over a flowering rosemary bush. The story says that the white flowers turned blue from that day on the bush was called the 'Rose of Mary'.
- Such countries as Canada, France, Belgium, Poland and the United Kingdom have Remembrance Day ceremonies.



Martu-ku Yiwarra Training Centre News

The Training Centre is off to a great start this term. This is our third year of operation and our numbers are still right up there. 12 Martu have commenced our very popular Certificate I Automotive course this term, which Andy and Alwyn from CRTAFE will assist us to deliver. Recent graduate Clinton Geary is assisting us as a Martu assistant trainer and mentor. Graduate Nathan Redmond will also assist us later this term so that Martu students have Martu staff helping them out and mentoring them through their training journey. It was our big vision back in 2017 to create our own Martu assistant trainers and mentors. Stewart Long did this for us last year, especially with the VET school students, and has now got a great job out at Salt Lake Potash. Thanks for your great work at the Training Centre Stewy. Malya!

Once again, we spoke to all the families who helped us to identify students for the course. These new students told us what they wanted to learn, ie what they would like to do at the Training Centre. Training they would come in for every day. There is nothing more important than attendance. Attendance is our highest priority. If students don't attend, they can't possibly learn anything from vocational training.

We work very hard in Kalgoorlie and Wiluna preparing high quality, relevant and interesting training to further encourage students to attend. Guess what? We had 100% attendance every day! Malya! Our attendance has never fallen below 90% in three years. We are a community training centre, responsive to the community's aspirations and employer's requirements. Our training is relevant. Our favourite words at the Training Centre – Martu self-determination and Martu voice

We always speak to employers about what they think the students should learn on the courses. They have to be happy that the students are learning the right things and that our training is relevant, authentic and meaningful, especially as it is nationally accredited in the Australian Quality Framework (AQF). This is a big deal. We appreciate the regular visits to the Training Centre by employers, families and other Wiluna residents who encourage our students. The students are very proud of themselves when people come in to visit them and show an interest in their training. It boosts their self-confidence.

Two school age students who had entirely disengaged from school in Wiluna this year have joined our training this term. Their families encouraged them to come to the Training Centre because they support the training and have helped us to design it. These students will be school VET students as they are still enrolled at school. This is a good outcome for everyone. These students have not missed a minute of training this week and are learning lots of new skills with their families at the Training Centre.

School age VET is a high priority for the Training Centre. We help young people to get good skills and make good decisions. We treat them as young adults, which they are. Their families support them at the Training Centre. Young people are vulnerable at this age. We have to work together to look after them. It is very important that families work with the school to keep their kids at high school so that they can access school VET when they are 16. We can then train them for employment when they are 18, ie they go from school to VET to work. This is the Yiwarra the families have asked us to put them on. We work with families to develop these students, including creating time and opportunities for Martu cultural learning and development, eg Law business.

If families can work with the school and give them good ideas to keep kids at school (nothing in education and training is more important than attendance), then these kids can come to us and join the adult Martu TAFE students to get ready for work through relevant training and development. These kids have to stay at school until they are 16 so that they are old enough for the training and can go from vocational training to work. The school can prepare high school kids for VET, so that they have the best chance of getting a job.

We train students for REAL jobs in and around WILUNA so that families can stay together.

A big thank you to Mo Pawero from DSS for all of his help. Mo leaves DSS soon and we are all wondering what we are going to do without him. Mo and I have worked together for 10 years, first with the big Australian Feral Camel Management Project out on the Lands and then in and around Wiluna. Thank you Mo, you've done yourself and DSS proud mate. You always put other people before yourself. You are the most un-selfish person I have ever met. You seek and take advice. You LISTEN to Martu and are always helping people out. You've got everyone's RESPECT! You are Malya!

Thank you also to DSS (Desert Support Services – Ranger mob) who create the opportunity for their Rangers and aspiring Rangers to access our nationally accredited training. The Training Centre/DSS collaboration is very strong, and of tremendous mutual benefit. We get a lot of great support from DSS. Our priorities and values are very closely aligned and we always enjoy having the DSS Rangers down at the Training Centre, helping them get ready for big on-country activities, and helping them square away all their vehicles and equipment when they come back to Wiluna. DSS employ a lot of Martu and our training helps them build capacity and capability. Martu voice is strong at DSS.

Andy from CRTAFE (our Registered Training Organisation (RTO)) came up this week and did a great job with the training and assessment, all practical, relevant and meaningful. Andy and I couldn't believe how much work the students completed in one week, and how far the students got with their project-based training and assessment. This is a very good group of students, and their families can be proud. 100% attendance every day means we move forward fast and learn even more together.

As usual, the students started the new course with a thorough briefing and induction. After some training, this was followed by a big project-based teamwork task to build course cohesiveness. The students worked together to clean up two vehicles provided to us by stakeholders for training this term. This is our way of saying thank you helping us out. Clinton and Briohny led the two teams.

We did more project-based training and assessment (our student's favourite way of learning – working together and learning new things with their families) over the week, including making crowbars for Parnka and fire buckets for their families to get around for yarning and eating. All the time, the students are learning by doing and working in teams. There were lots of happy families when the students took all of these things they made themselves back home to their families. Yuwawu!

On the last day of our first week of training, the students worked together as a team to put the Wiluna CDP trailer back together. This was a VERY big job. The front end had come off so there was a lot of thinking, measuring, planning, cutting, welding, grinding and heating to be done. The students worked late to finish the job properly. Everyone did something to help out. Clinton led the trailer repair gang. Andy taught everyone the skills and tricks to do the job properly with all the great TAFE equipment. The CDP gang can now do their jobs around Wiluna without having to worry about a broken trailer. Our students know a lot more about workshop tools, equipment, safety and teamwork. Everyone is a winner.

Next week the Aboriginal Justice Program (AJP) are in town so the Training Centre will be taking all the students up there to sort out drivers licenses, birth certificates, and other things that are causing very big problems in Wiluna. We have to sort the driver's license situation out in Wiluna. This is the biggest barrier to employment for our students. People need driver's licenses to work and help their families.

Thank you to everyone who supports the Training centre and keeps us going – the Wiluna Shire, DSS, Blackhams, Salt Lake Potash, Kalium Lakes, Jundee, Cameco, GWR, Mick Wilson, Jim Quadrio, Graham Harris, Peter Grundy, Mo Pawero, Kyle McGinn MLC and most importantly the Wiluna families who make sure everyone comes to training and who support the students throughout their training. Yuwawu!

I hope you all got to see the recent ABC television news, 7.30 Report and ABC on-line news story on the Training Centre and the students. Thank you to everyone involved for participating and making themselves available for the filming and interviews. It was fantastic to see everyone there supporting the Training Centre, the students and their families. The feedback was overwhelming and all very positive. The only problem is replying to all the messages and emails from around Australia, and even from England and Germany!

This ABC story was a big hit and everyone got to see what happens when people LISTEN to Aboriginal people and work TOGETHER to get the best outcomes for EVERYONE, especially families.

A big thank you and acknowledgement to Adriano Truscott and the Wiluna Remote Community School Council for setting all this up and getting us started in 2017. This is exactly what Martu families wanted to establish in Wiluna. The Wiluna Shire and local employers, our financial supporters, have helped us to achieve that. Our graduates are getting good jobs and more money for their families. Our innovative approach to training in remote areas has now been showcased around Australia on television.

The Martu-ku Yiwarra Training Centre is a Martu idea facilitated and administered by the Department of Education, delivering nationally accredited training from WA regional TAFE (CRTAFE), funded by the Wiluna Shire, local mining companies/employers, overseen by Martu Elders, partnered with DSS, collaborating with the Department of Justice, which has come to reality and been recognised nationally. How good is that! Everyone working together and moving forward, Martu way!

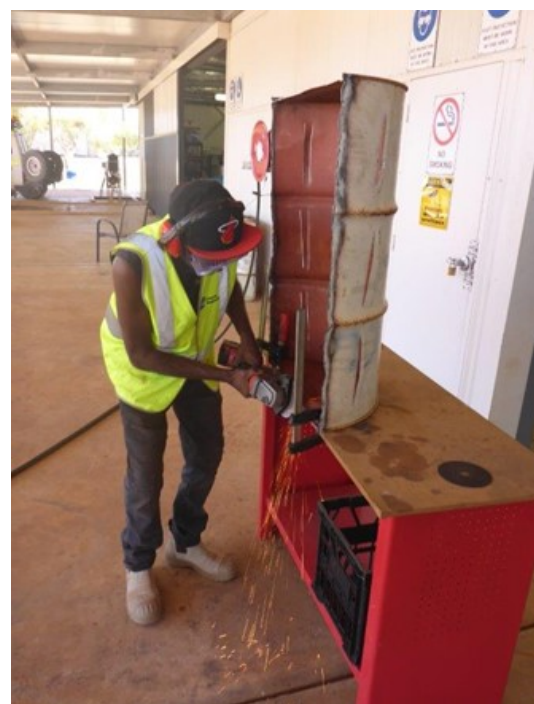

Employment News

The Martu-ku Yiwarra Training Centre's role is to provide high quality and relevant nationally accredited training in Wiluna to assist community residents to get jobs and develop their vocational skills. It is unique in that it is community-driven, ie responsive to community needs and employer requirements, and includes school VET students in all of its courses.

Our graduates are getting good jobs, many for the first time in their lives. The Wiluna Shire and local employers are working with us to both fund the Training Centre and to align and design our training to meet local employment requirements. Some of our students want to get a job, others want better jobs, so they train with us, meet employers and then get jobs. Some of the local employers have very innovative employment packages to assist Martu with their transition into demanding full time work, and this is working. Others, like DSS, have ongoing and very important casual on country work.

Another of our graduates who now has full time work is **Albi Narabe**. Albi successfully completed a Certificate I Automotive course with us in late 2018, and then went on to undertake some TAFE short courses with us this year to build up his skills and qualifications for a full time job at the mines.

Albi now works at Salt Lake Potash (SLP) and loves it. He is doing what he wants to do and is receiving good pay for his hard work. Albi came to the Training Centre in 2018 and asked us to help him onto a training and employment pathway. 12 months later he has nationally accredited training qualifications and a full time job he enjoys. This is what we are all about at the Training Centre.

SLP managers and staff regularly visit the Training Centre and encourage the students. This raises their profile in the community and develops relationships with our students and staff. They recently donated a pump and motor for the automotive students to learn about and work on. This means we can deliver relevant training that meets employer's requirements. There are many different jobs at potash mines and there are two of them around Wiluna.

Another Training Centre graduate who has gained employment is **Anthea Cutter**.

Anthea was one of our first students when we opened in 2017. Anthea's family, especially her mother Rita (Martu Elder), encouraged Anthea to join the training. We had a big family meeting to convince Anthea to join in the training. DSS were a big help too. She decided to give it a go.

Anthea said she thought she was too shy to train and get a job but we promised Anthea and her family that we would work with Anthea to make her more confident during her training. Anthea trained very hard for the next 12 months, never missed any training and was always helping out, especially on our big bush trips for Ranger training. Anthea learned lots of new things in her training but she also brought to us all of the amazing things she had learned from her Mum, Rita. This helped build up Anthea's confidence when she realised how many good things her Mum had taught her. Now she had an opportunity to share this knowledge and teach others, two-way.

We worked with the schools fantastic Two-Way Science Pathways program and Dave Broun even came out bush with us to Milyinyiri for a Two-Way Science Pathways trip. Anthea got her big break helping Dave teach high school students all the things that Rita had taught her. All of a sudden, Anthea knew where she wanted her training pathway to take her. She wanted to work at the school and help the Martu students and the teachers. Her role model was her Mum, Rita. Thank you to Dave Broun and Science Pathways for giving Anthea her big break and motivating her to get a job at the school. We then had a meeting with Mr T at the school and he let us know a job was coming up. Anthea wanted that job.

In August 2018 we took our students to the big Desert Discovery camp in the Gibson Desert with all of those scientists. This was the best thing we did in 2018. Anthea wanted to put her training, and what her Mum had taught her, into action. We organised for Anthea to take all the women scientists out on country for a day and then for her to deliver some big presentations to all the scientists about how Martu lived in the old days and how to find food and water in the desert, Martu way. The scientists loved it. They said it was the best thing they did out there. Anthea was a hit. Her training paid off.

Anthea still works at the school and is very enthusiastic about her work. Her family is very proud of her, especially her Mum, Rita. We are also very proud of Anthea as she is a Wiluna training role model.

Anthea successfully completed a Certificate I Automotive, a Certificate I in Conservation and Land Management and a Certificate II in Conservation and Land Management.

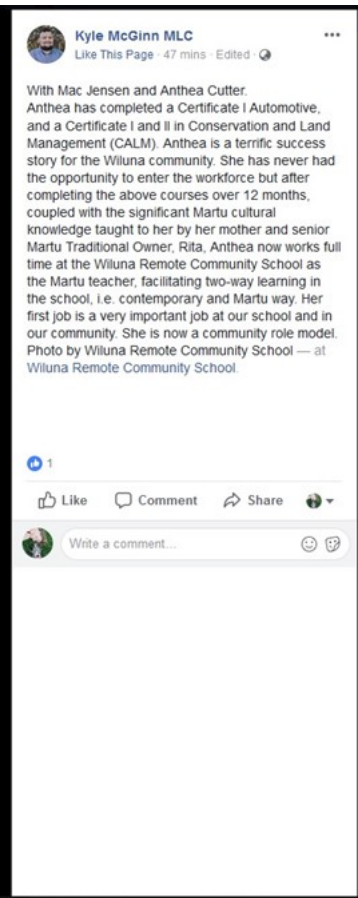

Success Story

Another Training Centre employment success story is Stewart Long, Martu Elder, Lawman, Senior Ranger and now working full time in the mining industry.

When we opened the Training Centre in June 2017, Stewart was working at the school as the school Ranger and cultural advisor. He came over to the Training Centre and offered to help me out with the big clean up (which took 2 weeks!). He then got all the Ranger gang together and Desert Support Services (DSS) organised for them to help me with the clean up for a few days. Stewart and the Rangers had high expectations of the Training Centre. It was going to change things in Wiluna.

Stewart and I knew each other from lots of bush work together in the desert when he was a Senior Ranger with DSS and I was running the feral camel aerial shooting project. Stewart was a big supporter of getting the Training Centre going. We discussed the project while we worked together cleaning up every day. He gave me lots of good advice. He told me all the other important Martu people who needed to have a say and give me good advice, Martu way, Martu voice. After lots of thinking, talking and listening, we knew what we had to do. Mr T agreed with the plan. He told us to 'make it happen'.

Stewart helped us out with the school VET students on our courses. He was their mentor and role model. There's not much Stewart doesn't know about the bush. He's also a Malya 'bush mechanic'. He did the training with us too, for two years! Stewart completed a Certificate I Automotive, Certificate I Conservation and Land Management, Certificate II Conservation and Land Management and a Certificate II Rural Operations. This nationally accredited TAFE training complemented Stewart's practical bush, cultural and Ranger skills. He got certificates that recognised the training. He felt good about this. He helped the school VET students through their training. Families training together, Martu way. He set the example. Stewart was great on bush trips. He knew all the country and all the stories. There is always too much Marlu and Partada for everyone when Stewart is around!

In term 3 this year, Stewart wanted to move on from his job at the school and do something different. He was looking for a job where he could use some of his new skills from nationally accredited TAFE training at the Training Centre. We talked about it. Stewart is a Martu leader. He takes this very seriously. He wanted a job that would make a difference to him, his family and other Martu. He decided he wanted to work at Salt Lake Potash (SLP), where he could pave the way for other Martu and then mentor them when they get out there.

Stewart and I are always talking about job opportunities for Martu kids when they grow up, especially school VET. Those kids need adults getting into good jobs so that when they are old enough to work, they will have mentors already there who know the ropes and can help them settle in. This is a big priority for us, getting adults into good jobs so that they can create pathways for the school VET when they are old enough to work. When the school VET kids come to the Training Centre for their last couple of years at school, they now have role models who have created training and employment pathways for them. Families working together, Martu way

Stewart is now working out at Salt Lake Potash (SLP). He's doing a good job and enjoying the work. He gets respect. Bomber is out there too. He helped Stewart settle in and learn the ropes. SLP gets a lot of good advice from Stewart and Bomber, and this helps SLP to create more jobs for Martu, two-way, Martu way.

Farm Household Allowance — Centrelink

The Australian Government has announced changes to the Farm Household Allowance (FHA). Farmers will get an extra payment if their 4 years of FHA ends before 1 July 2020. Single farmers will get \$7500.00 and members of a couple will get \$6,500.00 each.

Some of the improvements include:

- A simplified assets test
- A significant redesign of the application process and form, including allowing farming couples to apply using the same form.
- A strengthened case management approach to better support farmers in hardship through periods of financial difficulty.

To get Farm Household Allowance you must meet all the following:

- Be a farmer or partner of a farmer
- Be 16 years old or older
- Contribute labour and capital to an Australian farm, or are the partner of a farmer who does
- Have income and assets below certain amounts
- Have had less than 4 years of Farm Household Allowance

Your farm must have significant commercial purpose. The Department of Human Services will assess this based on all of the following:

- The purpose of your farm
- The prospect for profit
- Consistency of activity
- Whether your farm runs as a business
- The size, scale and permanency of your farm activity.
- On the day you claim Farm Household Allowance you must be an Australian resident and in Australia

The amount of Farm Household Allowance you can get depends on your circumstances. This payment is usually the same rate as Newstart Allowance or Youth Allowance.

If you have a partner, we may pay the allowance to both of you. You will get:

- A fortnightly payment for a maximum period of 4 cumulative years (1,460 days)
- An activity Supplement of up to \$4000.00 to pay for study, training or professional advice to help improve your financial position.
- A Farm Household Case Officer to work with you to assist you improve your financial

The amount of Farm Household Allowance you can get depends on your income and assets , with your income being below the cut off for the Newstart Allowance income test. The Department of Human Services also look at any off-farm income when working out your payment.

Any income received from the forced disposal of livestock, may be exempt from the income test. The Department of Human Services will exempt the income if you deposit it into a Farm Management Account.

The forced disposal includes selling or destroying livestock due to drought or natural disaster. It may also include when:

- Your farm can't support the livestock
- You have concern for the welfare of the livestock
- The law requires you to dispose of the livestock

Your off-farm income can affect your payment, so you must report any of this income earned each and every fortnight. You may be able to use your off-farm income against a loan. You can do this if you earn less than \$0.00 from your farm business. You can apply to offset up to \$80,000.00 of off-farm income against interest repayments on a loan. You must prove you can't renegotiate the loan contract. This legislation is before Parliament seeking to amend the criteria to \$100,00.00 instead of \$80,000.00

Assets Test

Part 1 - looks at non-farm and liquid assets you your family and your business owns. Liquid assets include cash, business bank accounts, term deposits and other financial accounts. Your family home and up to 2 hectares of land surrounding it are not included if it is listed on a single title and it is used for domestic purposes.

Part 2 - looks at your family's total farm assets. These are the assets you hold or use wholly or mainly for the farming enterprise and they can include shares you are required to hold to operate the farm or tradeable water assets from the Murray-Darling Basin and you will need to supply evidence to the Department of Human Services to support your ownership of water assets and shares essential to your farm operation.

Beware that farmers coming off welfare will be entitled to a new, one-off payment of \$13,000 for families, and a one-off payment of \$7500 for individuals. The payment will be available to farmers forced off the Farm Household Allowance (FHA) before July 2020 because they have exceeded the time limit permitted to receive the payments.

NATIONAL ON-FARM EMERGENCY WATER INFRASTRUCTURE REBATE SCHEME

The Australian and Western Australian Governments are working together to deliver \$4/6 million in national rebates to livestock farmers and pastoralists in rural Western Australia for on-farm water infrastructure.

The National On-Farm Emergency Water Infrastructure Rebate Scheme is available to eligible commercial livestock farmers and pastoralists in rural WA.

Showerhead Swap

Terms and conditions

It's important that you read and understand the terms and conditions before removing your showerhead(s).

By participating in the Showerhead Swap Program, you have accepted these terms and conditions.

To be eligible for free replacement showerhead(s) under the Showerhead Swap Program:

1. You must live in one of the towns as identified on the Water Corporation's website - Showerhead Swap Program webpage; and
2. If you are a tenant, you and the landlord must agree to participate in the Showerhead Swap Program, which includes the replacement of the old showerhead(s) with showerhead(s) provided under the Showerhead Swap Program.

The process:

3. You must take your old showerhead(s) and a copy of a recent bill from Water Corporation in your name or a recent waterwise letter, if you have received one, to an exchange point identified on Water Corporation's website at watercorporation.com.au/showerheadswap ("Exchange Point") to exchange it for a new replacement showerhead(s), only while supplies last.
4. A maximum of two old showerheads can be swapped for two replacement showerheads for each household, only while supplies last.
5. At the point in time that your old showerhead is accepted by the Exchange Point, the old showerhead becomes the property of the Water Corporation and cannot be returned to you.

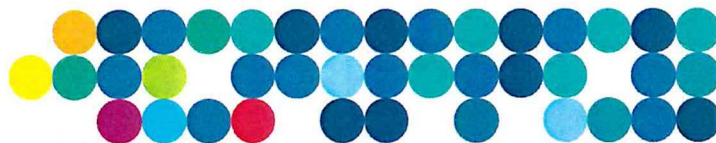
You are responsible for:

6. Removal of the old showerhead(s), including ensuring the removal of the old showerhead is compatible with existing systems, the wall fitting(s) and plumbing. If you are in any doubt or require assistance, we recommend that you ask a licensed Plumber for advice or help;
7. Installation of the replacement showerhead(s), including ensuring the installation is compatible with existing systems, the wall fitting(s) and plumbing. If you need assistance with installing the showerhead(s), we recommend you contact a licensed Plumber.

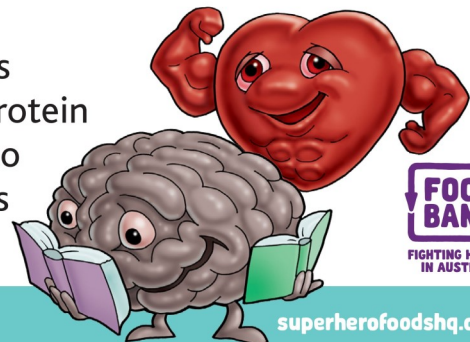

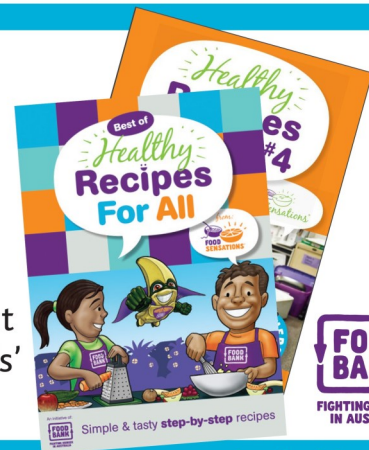

FOOD SAFETY IN THE HOME

It is important to follow these food safety and storage tips to keep your food free from bacteria and to keep you and your family safe and healthy.



ALWAYS

- Wash your hands in hot soapy water before cooking.
- Wash fruit and vegetables before eating
- Use separate chopping boards for raw meat and other foods



AFTER COOKING

- Allow hot food to cool. Once food has stopped steaming, cover and refrigerate within 1-2 hours of cooking.
- If food is left out of the fridge for more than 2 hours, throw it away.
- Keep left over food in the fridge for 2-3 days. If not eaten, either freeze or throw away.



STORING FOOD SAFELY

- Store meat and fish at the bottom of the fridge, wrapped properly or stored in an airtight container.
- Keep food either below 5C or over 60C to avoid having food in the temperature danger zone.
- Defrost frozen food in the fridge or microwave not on the bench or in water.
- Do not use food if it has been left on the bench for over 2 hours.
- Do not use food past its 'use by date'.

HIGH RISK FOODS

Sliced deli meat, poultry (chicken), yoghurt, milk, cheese, cooked rice and pasta, seafood and food containing eggs.

These foods need to be stored correctly in the fridge to prevent food poisoning.



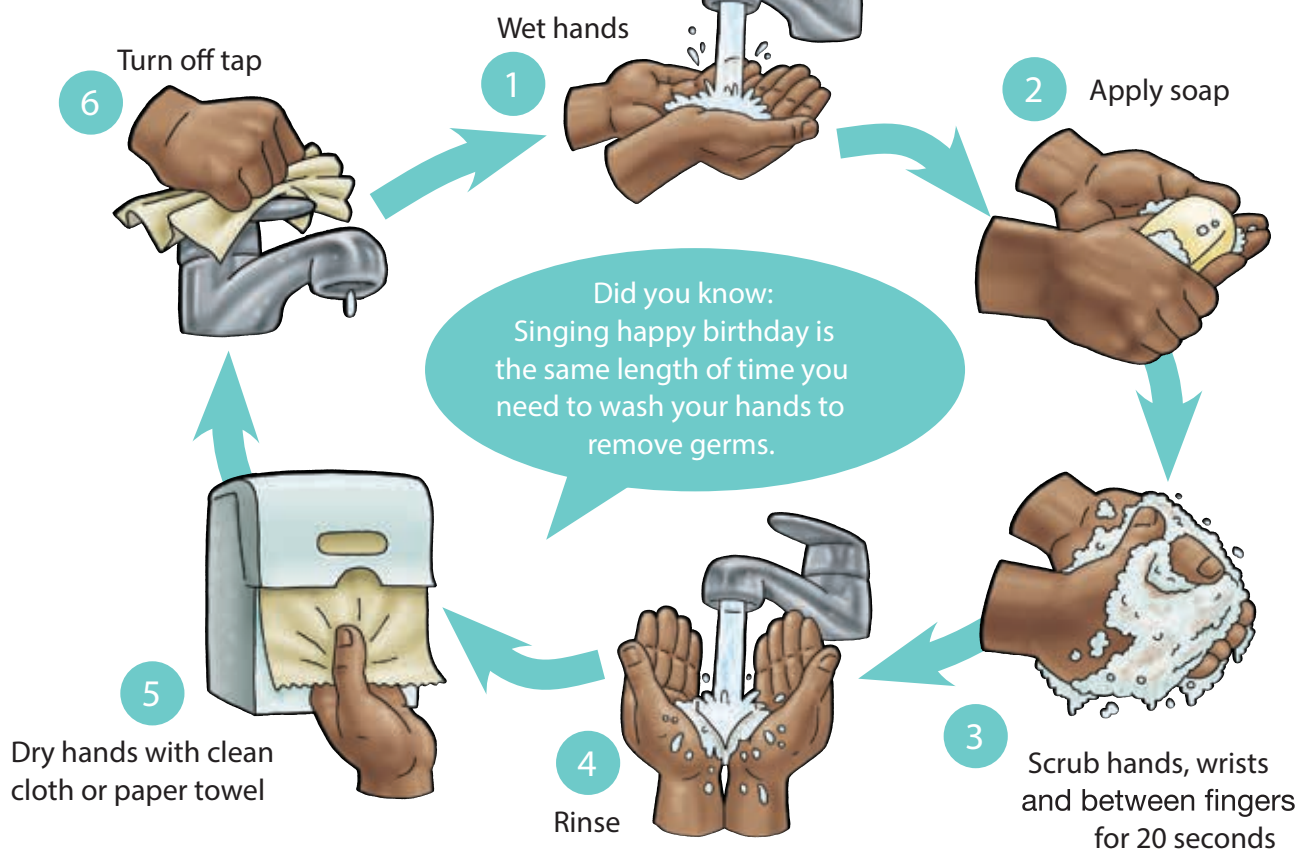

Healthy Lamb Shank with Mash

Ingredients

- ◆ Spray oil or canola oil
- ◆ 1 Lamb shank
- ◆ 1tbs plain flour
- ◆ Pepper to taste
- ◆ 1 onion chopped
- ◆ 4 cloves garlic, chopped
- ◆ 1 stalk celery, chopped
- ◆ 10 mushrooms
- ◆ 1 x 400g can of no-added-salt diced tomatoes
- ◆ 1 tbs Worcestershire sauce
- ◆ 1 tbs dried rosemary, or 15cm if using fresh
- ◆ 1 tbs plum jam
- ◆ 1 cup of water
- ◆ 1 tsp reduced-salt vegetable stock powder
- ◆ 2 potatoes, chopped
- ◆ 30ml low-fat milk

Method

1. Preheat oven to 160°C
2. Toss lamb with flour and pepper in a plastic bag. Heat oil in a large non stick frypan
3. Shake extra flour off lamb and pay-fry until brown on all sides (about 5 minutes) and place in a large casserole dish with a lid
4. Add all vegetables except tomatoes and potatoes to the frypan and cook for 5 minutes, stirring often until they begin to colour slightly
5. Add the tomatoes, Worcestershire sauce, rosemary, jam, water, stock powder and leftover flour from the plastic bag. Stir well and bring to the boil.
6. Pour tomato-vegetable mixture over the lamb, cover with a lid or foil and bake in the oven for at least 2 hours. Remove the casserole a couple of times during cooking, and ladle the sauce over the top of the meat to baste. After 2 1/2 to 3 hours the should fall off the bone.
7. To prepare mash, microwave or boil potatoes till a fork goes easily into the pieces. Add milk and pepper and mash well with a fork or potato masher until you get the texture you like.

Variation: Swap one of the potatoes for sweet potato or a cup of peas to add more colour to your plate.

WA Drought Assistance Fund Application Guidelines

1. The aim of the fund is to provide relief to individuals, families and households whose financial resources are insufficient to obtain all that is necessary, not only for a bare existence, but for a modest standard of living in the Australian community. **These monies are available for households that are drought affected and dependent on farming as their primary source of income.**
2. Strict confidentiality regarding applications will be maintained at all times.
3. Payments made to applicants from the Community Fund are determined in accordance with the Deed of Trust for The County Women's Association of Western Australia (Inc) Community Fund, by the trustee, being CWA of WA DGR Funds Pty Ltd Board (the Board)
4. The amount to be paid per applicant is no more than \$5000.00 per applicant/per annum, except in circumstances identified by the Chairperson of the Board. The Chairperson has the authority to make a determination in extraordinary circumstances.
5. Eligible applicants are:

Farmers/pastoralists or farming dependent contractors or households: and/or a farming dependent family (including families servicing farming, such as farming contractors and local rural households).

Over 18 years of age and reside in Australia. Proof of identity (such as a copy of a driver's licence, passport or birth certificate) must be attached to the application.

In addition, applicants must also demonstrate the following:

They must be located in a Western Australian area that is identified as being drought affected: and

A reliance on farming/pastoral or farming related activities for the majority of their income; and

Evidence that their primary source of income has suffered as a direct result of drought; and

Evidence to support their claims of insufficient financial resources> (This may include copies of Centrelink income statements, tax returns, and bank statements for the last three months or a letter from an accountant or financial counsellor confirming financial distress)

6. Grants are available to help meet household expenses. Examples of household expenses include:
Food, school expenses, dental and medical, such as gap payments and the cost of travel to access treatment or Centrelink Services
7. Copies of accounts to be paid are to be submitted with applications, where applicable.
8. The successful applicant will be informed of the purpose of the payment and it's intended application. Payments to provide relief to a business enterprise or for business purposes will not be made eg damage to commercial assets.
9. Funds will be granted subject to Board discretion and funding availability. Grants may be subject to conditions as determined by the Board.
10. These conditions may be subject to variation, upon approval of the Board.

Consumers urged to check cars for unsafe airbags urgently

Compulsory recall on Takata airbags began in March 2018 and since then around 77,000 airbags are being replaced in vehicles every month. Globally, there are an estimated 100 million vehicles affected, and in Australia there are almost 3 million vehicles affected. In Western Australia, there are almost 46,000 airbags yet to be replaced.

However, there are concerns that remote communities are not getting the message. Data analysis shows that people from rural and regional communities and those from a culturally and linguistically diverse background are falling behind national rates of replacement. The ACCC has set up an outreach program in targeted Indigenous communities to spread the word. In addition, ACCC is encouraging children with parents who don't have good English skills to help check whether their vehicle is affected.

In Western Australia car owners are reminded that the Department of Transport exercises its powers to cancel vehicle licences if owners do not respond to notices to replace the most dangerous Alpha airbags. Cars should not be driven until replacement airbags are fitted.

The responsibility to replace the Takata airbags rests with the vehicle manufacturer, with the rectification work being done through their respective dealer franchise network. Makers of cars must make it a priority to replace defective Takata airbags in vehicles located in places that get high heat and humidity, such as the Kimberley.

Even If you are in a remote location, it is still the manufacturer's/dealer's responsibility to make whatever arrangements are necessary to have the work carried out. The replacement of the Takata airbag is free and vehicle owners do not incur any costs for having this work done.

You can check whether your vehicle is affected by visiting www.ismyairbagsafe.com.au. You can also visit the vehicle manufacturer's website. All you need is your registration plate number and the state the vehicle is registered in. If you are still unclear after using the online tool, or you just have remaining queries about whether your vehicle is affected by the Takata recall, you should contact your vehicle manufacturer or importer direct. There have been 26 reported deaths worldwide and over 300 injuries so don't delay.

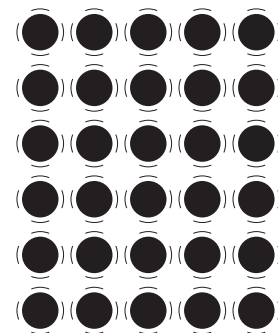
